

We distribute ration packs, fresh meat through the Qurbani Appeal, and daily hot meals to ensure that no one in our targeted communities goes to bed hungry.

Our Free Medical Camps and Free Eye Camps offer essential healthcare services, medications, diagnostics, and surgeries to those who cannot afford medical treatment.

SDG 4: Quality Education

Through the ÉduCare program, MWF supports students from disadvantaged backgrounds by covering tuition, books, and uniforms, helping reduce dropout rates and promote lifelong learning.

MWF promotes women's dignity through programs that support widows, female-headed households, and equal participation in collective marriages, where financial burdens and dowry pressures are eliminated.

During emergencies, MWF provides clean drinking water and hygiene kits to affected families, particularly in disaster-hit areas like Sindh and Balochistan.


























SDG 10: Reduced Inequalities

COLLECTVE QURBANI





The Collective Qurbani Project is a vital annual initiative of Minhaj Welfare Foundation that ensures the spirit of Eid-ul-Adha reaches the most deserving segments of society. Many impoverished families in Pakistan are unable to afford meat even once a year, making Eid a particularly difficult time. Through this project, MWF organizes and performs Qurbani (sacrifice) on behalf of donors and distributes the meat to vulnerable families, orphans, widows, and the elderly. This initiative not only fulfills a religious obligation but also promotes social equality, compassion, and dignity during the blessed days of Eid.





In 2023, MWF successfully carried out Collective Qurbani operations in over 20 cities across Pakistan, including remote and underserved areas. More than 5,000 meat boxes were distributed to families who would otherwise go without on Eid. This large-scale outreach helped improve nutrition, strengthen community bonds, and brought smiles to thousands of faces. The project continues to serve as a powerful example of how collective action, guided by faith and humanity, can bring meaningful change to people's lives—especially during times of celebration that should be shared by all.





WINTER APPEAL

In the harsh winter of 2023, MWF (Muslim Welfare Foundation) extended critical support to flood-affected families in South Punjab, where thousands were still living in makeshift tents and shelters after the devastating 2022 floods. Through our Winter Appeal, we distributed 1,000 food packs along with warm clothing and blankets, providing immediate relief to those battling the cold without proper shelter. This initiative not only addressed hunger but also protected vulnerable families—especially women and children—from life-threatening winter conditions. At MWF, we believe in compassion in action, and this campaign was a step toward restoring dignity and hope in communities struggling to rebuild their lives—

WATER FOR ALL

Rapid population growth, depleting groundwater, and poor water governance further compound the crisis, fuelling Pakistan's march toward "absolute water scarcity" in the near future.

Floods in 2022 further worsened the situation, leaving over 10 million people without access to safe drinking water, and exposing communities to outbreaks of cholera, diarrhea, and malnutrition.

As part of efforts to mitigate this crisis, MWF has installed over 1,000 water pumps in water-stressed areas across Pakistan. This intervention has significantly improved access to clean and reliable water for thousands of households, reducing distances traveled by women and children for collection, and cutting exposure to contaminated sources. By stabilizing local water supply, these pumps support better hygiene, reduce disease incidence, improve school attendance, and boost productivity in rural communities.





ORPHAN CARE

The Orphans Care project under Minhaj
Welfare Foundation (MWF) aims to
provide comprehensive support to
orphaned and destitute children—
offering shelter, education, medical care,
and holistic personality development.

Aghosh Orphan Care Home in Lahore is one of Pakistan's largest orphan institutions. Children are supported via structured schooling through Minhaj Model School and Quran memorization (Hifz-e-Quran) programs, individual tutoring, recreational outings, and regular spiritual activities—ensuring each child receives well-rounded care both academically and emotionally.



ORPHAN CARE COMPLEX

Minhaj Welfare Orphan Care Complex will be more than just a safe environment for orphaned and needy children; it will be dedicated to providing children access to high-quality care and excellent facilities. Every child will get the best opportunity in education, lifeskills, and personality development through outstanding child management and safeguarding policies. We aim to ensure they have the best chance at attaining a bright future for them selves.



Educational Complex

100 classrooms and nursery facilities are equally distributed in two complexes for boys and girls each. The educational facilities will serve academic as well as recreational needs of over 2000 children, from the age of nursery up to high school.



Boarding Complex

100 apartments are equally distributed between two complexes for boys and girls each. Boarding facilities will incorporate all the accommodation needs of a normal family unit within each apartment. Additional shared social spaces like Gym, dining halls, outdoor lawns will also be included.

Admin & Recreation

It will also serve as a management hub for all the different complexes. This complex will include a mosque, a Security & CCTV monitoring centre, Industrial Kitchen, Hall, management offices, Auditorium, Indoor Sports, and Facilities of Warehousing & Distribution Centre.

Sustainability

Minhaj Welfare Foundation recognizes that access to quality healthcare remains a major challenge for millions of low-income families in Pakistan, especially in remote and underdeveloped areas. To address this critical need, MWF organizes free medical camps throughout the year, bringing essential healthcare services directly to those who need them most. These camps are staffed by qualified doctors and paramedics, offering consultations, diagnostics, treatment, and awareness sessions. Free medicines are also provided to ensure that patients receive complete care without financial burden.

In 2023, hundreds of medical camps were successfully held across various cities, towns, and villages of Pakistan, where MWF provided free medical care and medicines to over 26,000 patients. These camps made a significant difference in early diagnosis and treatment of common illnesses, maternal and child health issues, and chronic diseases. Many individuals who had never consulted a doctor before were treated with dignity and compassion. The initiative continues to save lives, reduce suffering, and promote health equity among the most vulnerable populations of the country.





COLLECTIVE MARRIAGES

The Collective Marriages Project is one of Minhaj Welfare Foundation's most impactful social welfare initiatives, designed to support underprivileged families who cannot afford the high costs associated with weddings. In Pakistan, financial pressures and dowry expectations often delay or prevent marriages, especially for orphaned girls or those from low-income backgrounds.

Through this project, MWF organizes large-scale marriage ceremonies, bringing together multiple couples in a single dignified event that eliminates social stigma and financial burden. Each couple is provided with essential household items, furniture, clothing, and a wedding meal—ensuring they start their new journey with stability and joy.



EMERGENCY RELIEF

Flood 2023


In 2023, from mid-March through mid-July, Pakistan experienced widespread monsoon flooding that largely affected Punjab, claiming at least 159 lives and injuring around 264 people.

The flooding displaced tens of thousands, destroyed homes, agricultural lands, and infrastructure, and exacerbated health risks from water-borne and vector-borne diseases. Amid these hardships, Minhaj Welfare Foundation swiftly expanded its emergency response. The foundation distributed approximately 212,000 cooked meals to flood-affected individuals—including women and children—setting up tent villages complete with kitchens in severely impacted areas.

In tandem, medical camps staffed by volunteer doctors delivered free medical aid to about 195,000 people, addressing common flood-related illnesses such as gastrointestinal infections, malaria, skin conditions, and respiratory ailments.

These relief efforts provided timely nourishment and health services when communities were most vulnerable, offering critical support in the wake of widespread devastation.

























VOLUNTEERS

During the devastating 2023 floods in Pakistan, Minhaj Welfare Foundation's strength was amplified by the unwavering dedication of its volunteer force. With over 1,000 registered volunteers nationwide, these selfless individuals played a frontline role in relief operations distributing over 10,000 cooked meals and assisting at medical camps that provided free health services to around 10,000 flood-affected people.

Their commitment in the face of adversity brought hope and relief to vulnerable communities across Punjab, Balochistan, and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. In recognition of their outstanding service, Minhaj Welfare Foundation honors volunteers with shields and souvenirs as tokens of appreciation. The foundation also invests in their growth through regular training and development programs, ensuring they are equipped with the skills and knowledge needed to respond effectively during emergencies. These volunteers remain the backbone of our humanitarian mission, embodying the spirit of compassion and community service.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of MINHAJ WELFARE FOUNDATION which comprise the statement of financial position as at June 30, 2023, and the income and expenditure account for the year than ended, statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in fund, statement of cash flows for the year than ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies

In our opinion the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of MINHAJ WELFARE FOUNDATION as at June 30, 2023 and of its financial performance for the year then ended and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with approved accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) as applicable in Pakistan. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Foundation in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants as adopted by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan(the code), and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with the accounting with the Approved accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Management's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Foundation or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those Charged with Governance are responsible for overseeing the Foundation's financial reporting process.



















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Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with International Standards on Auditing as applicable in Pakistan will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing as applicable in Pakistan, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to
 fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit
 evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not
 detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error,
 as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override
 of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit
 procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an
 opinion on the effectiveness of the Foundation's internal control.
