

During emergencies, MWF provides clean drinking water and hygiene kits to affected families, particularly in disaster-hit areas like Sindh and Balochistan.


## **SDG 10: Reduced Inequalities**

# **RAMADAN RELIEF**

This year Minhaj Welfare Foundation (MWF) continued its mission of serving humanity by launching a large-scale Ramadan and Eid relief campaign across Pakistan. During the holy month, we distributed thousands of Ramadan food packs to impoverished families, ensuring they could observe fasting with dignity.

As Eid approached, we brought joy to over 500 underprivileged children with special Eid gifts, spreading smiles during the festive season. Additionally, our teams reached 15 cities nationwide, delivering 5,000+ food boxes to vulnerable communities, addressing hunger and strengthening hope. Through these initiatives, MWF upheld its commitment to compassion in action—because no one should be left behind in times of celebration or need.





# **WINTER APPEAL**

As winter's icy grip tightened over Gilgit-Baltistan, the Minhaj Welfare Foundation (MWF) launched its Winter Appeal 2024 to provide critical relief to vulnerable communities battling the harsh cold. In this remote, high-altitude region, sub-zero temperatures and heavy snowfall make survival a daily struggle for families with limited resources.

This year, MWF's team journeyed deep into Gilgit-Baltistan, reaching villages where freezing winds and rugged terrain cut off access to basic necessities. Understanding the urgent need, we distributed warm clothing, blankets, hats, and family food packs to over 500 families, ensuring they had protection against the bitter cold and enough food to sustain them through the toughest months.

For the people of Gilgit-Baltistan, winter is not just a season—it's a test of resilience. Without proper shelter or warm clothing, the elderly and children are particularly at risk. MWF's intervention provided immediate relief, with each food pack containing essentials like flour, rice, pulses, and cooking oil to help families stay nourished.

At MWF, we believe in action over words. This year's Winter Appeal reaffirmed our commitment to standing with those in need, offering not just material support but also hope. Thanks to the generosity of our donors and the dedication of our volunteers, we brought warmth and dignity to the people of Gilgit-Baltistan—because no one should face winter's cruelty alone.

# **WATER FOR ALL**

Pakistan faces a growing water crisis, driven by rapid population growth, depleting groundwater reserves, and weak water governance pushing the country toward "absolute water scarcity" in the coming years. Recurring floods exacerbate this challenge, contaminating water sources, displacing communities, and leaving millions without access to safe drinking water. The resulting waterborne disease outbreaks—including cholera, diarrhea, and malnutrition—further strain vulnerable populations.

To combat this crisis, Minhaj Welfare Foundation (MWF) has installed over 1,000 water pumps in water-stressed regions across Pakistan. These interventions have transformed lives by:

- Providing immediate access to clean, reliable water for thousands of households.
- Reducing the burden on women and children, who no longer need to travel long distances to collect water.
- Lowering exposure to contaminated sources, improving community health and hygiene.

Through these efforts, MWF continues to address Pakistan's water emergency, ensuring safer, more sustainable futures for those most at risk.

# **ORPHAN CARE**

Minhaj Welfare Foundation's Orphans Care Project provides comprehensive support to orphaned and vulnerable children through shelter, education, healthcare, and holistic development. The Aghosh Orphan Care Home in Lahore, one of Pakistan's largest orphan care institutions, offers structured schooling through Minhaj Model School alongside Hifz-e-Quran programs, personalized tutoring, recreational activities, and spiritual guidance. This integrated approach ensures each child receives balanced care—nurturing their academic growth, emotional well-being, and moral development to build a foundation for a brighter future.



## Educational Complex

100 classrooms and nursery facilities are equally distributed in two complexes for boys and girls each. The educational facilities will serve academic as well as recreational needs of over 2000 children, from the age of nursery up to high school.



## Boarding Complex


100 apartments are equally distributed between two complexes for boys and girls each. Boarding facilities will incorporate all the accommodation needs of a normal family unit within each apartment. Additional shared social spaces like Gym, dining halls, outdoor lawns will also be included.

# COLLECTIVE MARRIAGES

The Collective Marriages Project is one of Minhaj Welfare Foundation's most impactful social welfare initiatives, designed to support underprivileged families who cannot afford the high costs associated with weddings. In Pakistan, financial pressures and dowry expectations often delay or prevent marriages, especially for orphaned girls or those from low-income backgrounds.

Through this project, MWF organizes large-scale marriage ceremonies, bringing together multiple couples in a single dignified event that eliminates social stigma and financial burden. Each couple is provided with essential household items, furniture, clothing, and a wedding meal—ensuring they start their new journey with stability and joy.





In 2024, the Minhaj Welfare Foundation (MWF) continued its vital Collective Qurbani Project, bringing the joy and blessings of Eid-ul-Adha to thousands of underprivileged families across Pakistan. For many struggling with extreme poverty, even a single meal with meat remains an unaffordable luxury. MWF's initiative bridges this gap by performing Qurbani on behalf of generous donors and distributing fresh meat to orphans, widows, the elderly, and marginalized communities.

This year, MWF expanded its reach, conducting Qurbani operations in 25+ cities, including remote regions often overlooked in aid efforts. Over 7,000 meat packs were distributed—each bringing nutrition, hope, and the spirit of communal sharing to families in need. The initiative not only provided immediate relief but also strengthened bonds within communities, reminding everyone that Eid's blessings are for all.


As MWF grows this project year after year, the vision remains clear: to create a more equitable society where faith, kindness, and collective action uplift the most vulnerable. In 2025, we aim to extend our efforts further, ensuring even more families experience the warmth of Eid.











Minhaj Welfare Foundation recognizes that access to quality healthcare remains a major challenge for millions of low-income families in Pakistan, especially in remote and underdeveloped areas. To address this critical need, MWF organizes free medical camps throughout the year, bringing essential healthcare services directly to those who need them most. These camps are staffed by qualified doctors and paramedics, offering consultations, diagnostics, treatment, and awareness sessions. Free medicines are also provided to ensure that patients receive complete care without financial burden.

In 2024, hundreds of medical camps were successfully held across various cities, towns, and villages of Pakistan, where MWF provided free medical care and medicines to over 58,000 patients. These camps made a

significant difference in early diagnosis and treatment of common illnesses, maternal and child health issues, and chronic diseases. Many individuals who had never consulted a doctor before were treated with dignity and compassion. The initiative continues to save lives, reduce suffering, and promote health equity among the most vulnerable populations of the country.



# **Flood 2024**

Pakistan experienced continued floods due to heavy rainfall from April 12-28, primarily affecting Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) and Balochistan provinces. The toll has risen to 117 fatalities and 139 injuries, with extensive damage reported, including 464 schools, over 5,800 houses and more than 700 livestock nationwide. UN Satellite imagery reveals that approximately 9,000 km<sup>2</sup> of land was affected by flood waters between April 20-24, 2024, with an estimated 1.5 million people potentially exposed or residing close to flooded areas in Pakistan

Minhaj Welfare Foundation (MWF) launched a rapid, large-scale relief operation, delivering 7,000+ cooked meals, 6,000+ flood affected individuals benefited from our free medical camps.

Free medical camps treating thousands of waterborne diseases. MWF's targeted interventions provided lifesaving support where infrastructure collapsed, prioritising women, children, and the elderly. As recovery begins, MWF remains committed to rebuilding resilient communities through long-term rehabilitation projects.



#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

#### Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of MINHAJ WELFARE FOUNDATION ("the Foundation"), which comprise the statement of financial position as at June 30, 2024, and the statement of income and expenditure, statement of changes in fund and the statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, (or give a true and fair view of) the financial position of MINHAJ WELFARE FOUNDATION as at June 30, 2024, and (of) its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with approved accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan.

#### Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with the International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) as applicable in Pakistan. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Foundation in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants as adopted by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan (the Code), and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

The Management are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with the approved accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan, and for such internal control as the Management determine(s) is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Foundation's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Foundation or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Foundation financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs as applicable in Pakistan will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with ISAs as applicable in Pakistan, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identity and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to finad or error, design and perform audit precedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as freed may involve collection, furgery, intentional certainous, misrepresentations, or the everyide of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control polocant to the suclit in order to design and it procedures that are appropriate
  in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Foundation's internal
  control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.

Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the data of our auditor's report.   presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the studit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our studit.

#### Other Matter

The financial statements of the Foundation for the year ended June 30, 2023, were stafited by another staditor who expressed an unmodified opinion on those financial statements on Pebruary 19, 2024.
